She is editor of *Shelf Life*, an anthology by writers with a reduced life expectancy for the National Disability Arts Forum (www.ndaf.org). Currently she is the Arts and Humanities Research Council (AHRC) Creative Fellow in the School of Performance Arts at Exeter University, working on the research through practice project "Alternative Dramaturgies Informed by a Disability and d/Deaf Perspective" and tutoring on the MA in Playwriting and Script Development.
